Course Title: Introduction to Poetry

**Course Objective**: The course deals with the nature of poetry (definition, elements, forms and functions) against the background of the nature of literature in general. Critical appreciation of poetry will include detailed investigation of meaning and application of literary devices, imagistic, figures, rhetorical figures, sound devices, rhythmical devices, grammatical and structural devices, reading of poetry, interpretation, discussing artistic features etc. Poems for the course will be African and Non-African.

## **Course Outline**

Week 1: Nature, Concept, scope and characteristics of Poetry

Theory of 'Content' and 'Form;' Language; Explicit and Implicit situations in poetry; Review questions.

**Week 2:** Implications of Various Definitions of Poetry by different scholars:

Plato, Aristotle, T.S Eliot, William Wordsworth, John Stuart Mills, Edmund Burke, Romanus Egudu, Alexander Pope, A.E Housman, Bailey, John Reynolds, Senanu and Vincent, W.H Auden, Ebenezer Eliot, Oscar Wilde, Review Questions

Week 3: Concept of Rhythm in Poetry I: Repetitions and Rhymes

Word rhyme, Rhyme scheme, Phonetic rhyme, The couplet, alternate rhymes, refrain/chorus, phrasal rhymes, clausal rhymes, sentence rhymes, syntactic parallelism. Review Questions.

Week 4: Concept of Rhythm in Poetry II: Metre

Syllables; syllabic verse; Accentual syllabic verse; Types of Feet: Substitution of feet, Defective feet; Types of Lines; Scanning, Rhetoric variation; Types of Pauses: End line, Internal Pauses, Quantitative Variation, Forced Pauses. Review Questions

Week 5: Language of poetry I: Similarity, Contrariety, affiliation and Imagination,

Simile, metaphor, parable, allegory, fable, symbol, antomasia, Antithesis, parallel, epigram, oxymoron, paradox, climax., Synecdoche, metonymy, hypallage, allusion, Personification, apostrophe, invocation, hyperbole, Review Questions.

Week 6: Language of Poetry II: Circuitous, Acoustics and Construction

Innuendo, proverbs, pun and ambiguity, euphemism, litotes/meiosis, alliteration, assonance, consonance, onomatopoeia, rhetorical question, hendiadys, syllepsis, zeugma, pleonasm. Review questions.

Week 7: Types of Poetry I:

Lyric, Sonnet, Elegy/Dirge, Ballad, Ode, Mock-Heroic Poetry. Review Questions.

Week 8: Types of Poetry II:

Descriptive Poetry, Narrative Poetry, Dramatic Poetry, Satiric Poetry, Metaphysical Poetry, Romantic Poetry, Negritude Poetry, Civil War Poetry. Review Questions.

**Week 9:** Steps towards Poetry Appreciation I:

Titles, Context, Speaker, Images. Review Questions.

**Week 10:** Steps Towards Poetry Appreciation II:

Diction, Rhythm, Stanza, Lines, Theme. Review Questions.

**Week 11:** Poetry Practical: Recitation, Writing, Criticism

**Week 12:** Poetry Practical: Recitation, Writing, Criticism
